LEARNING INCLUSION

The Importance of Getting Your Eyes and Ears Checked Regularly

Children often assume their vision is just like everyone else's, which means that vision problems can easily go undetected. Poor vision can interfere with their ability to learn and meet their full potential, and can even compromise their physical, emotional and social development. Getting your eyes test is important for the following reasons:

- Visual Discrimination: The ability to identify differences and similarities in shapes, sizes, colours, and patterns, important for tasks like distinguishing letters and words. Children with poor visual discrimination may struggle with reading, puzzles, and noticing small details.
- Visual Memory: The skill of recalling what a shape, object, or symbol looks like.
 Children with weak visual memory may have trouble with math, reading, spelling, and copying information from the board.
- Spatial Relationships: Understanding how objects, letters, and shapes relate to
 one another. Children who struggle with this may confuse left and right, or
 reverse letters and words.
- Form Constancy: The ability to recognize objects, letters, or numbers even if their size, position, or context changes. Children with difficulties in form constancy may not recognize letters or numbers in different formats.
- Sequential Memory: The skill to remember and recall a sequence of events or objects in the correct order. Poor sequential memory can lead to trouble with spelling, reading, and recognizing patterns.
- Visual Figure–Ground: The ability to focus on important details without being
 distracted by irrelevant background information. Children who struggle with this
 may have difficulty concentrating on busy pages or copying notes from a
 cluttered board.
- Visual Closure: The ability to identify objects or words when only partially visible.
 It helps with fluent reading by allowing children to recognize words by their overall shape without needing to see every letter.

If it has been more than two years or if your child has never had their eyes tested, please consider getting an eye test soon.
